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#### ST DAVID'S ESPORTS DEBUT IN THE U

St. David's College will debut in competitive E-sports gaming tournaments on October 11th with students readying up for the British E-sports Student Championship and the Welsh Esports League.

This marks a significant milestone for the College, offering invaluable experiences and opportunities for students to proudly represent their College Esports team for the first time. Learners will be engaging in intense competition with schools and colleges from across the UK, showcasing their gaming prowess in competitive online gaming leagues.

Our IT department has made extensive efforts to establish a dedicated gaming room for the college this year. Each system has been equipped with state-of-the-art and updated hardware, guaranteeing that students can engage in e-sports tournaments with the best performance. These changes ensure consistent frame rates across all games, crucial for keeping pace with the intense speed and competitive nature of these games.

Individual students have been assigned different roles to commit to within their teams, to ensure they look after and support their groups; these roles can include Coaches, managers, promoters, event organisers and media marketers. Students will often be tasked with creating their own events and it's these efforts that will present our learners with invaluable opportunities to build upon their skills in

esports in readiness for **life after college** and create sizable experiences they can use within their **UCAS applications**.

A total of 130 students have expressed keen interest in getting themselves involved with the College E-sports community. Under the guidance of Mr. Hazel, these students will be preparing for the main tournaments through structured competitive learning sessions held every Wednesday from 4 pm to 6 pm, after regular college hours. The main tournament features competitions in highly popular and competitive gaming titles, such as League of Legends, Rocket League, Valorant, and Overwatch 2.

League of Legends features a dynamic 5-player multiplayer online battle arena, wherein our learners from team Crystal Crusaders must engage in a fierce strategic competition against an opposing college. The success of a team hinges on their management of resources, infantry and skills; executing a careful and methodical advancement within three lanes to gradually gain the upper hand and seize pivotal moments to strike at their opponents' resources.

Rocket League presents a high-octane and challenging 3-player multiplayer online football match, with the unique twist of controlling rocket-powered cars – the challenge is as formidable as it sounds. Our learners from team Dynamic Drifters must work together and communicate effectively

with their rocket-powered vehicles, juggling the metal football with their car chassis towards the opponent's goal.

Valorant immerses players in a team-based **first-person tactical shooter** set in the near future, where 5 players on each side engage in fast and intensive rounds. Before each round starts, players are assigned to either the defending or attacking team. In this high-action environment, our learners from team Shadow Siren's (female only) or Recon Raiders (male only) must work together swiftly to accomplish objectives, aiming to gain an edge over their opposition by putting them at a strategic disadvantage.

Overwatch 2 share similarities with Valorant in that, players partake in fast-paced 5-a-side rounds of attacking and defending team gameplay. Our learners from team Vortex Vanguard will need to collaborate effectively to beat their opponents by points. Scores will be tallied at the conclusion of each round, with the hopes of securing victory through strategic play and effective teamwork.


Beyond the main championships, students can engage in broader cup tournaments. These include the **Women in E-sports tournament**, designed exclusively for female-run teams such as the Shadow Siren's in Valorant and Overwatch 2. **The Williams Esports competition** places our learners into high-speed racing in **F1 2023**, pitting them against students

from across the UK. Additionally, students can participate in **Street Fighter 5**, a side-on **1v1 fighting game**, and Apex Legends, a 20-player battle royale, both accessible at any time.


Mr. Hazel has extended his lunchtimes for gaming clubs in his classrooms outside of tournament schedules. These clubs welcome all students every lunchtime on Monday, Tuesday, and Thursday. Although, the Friday lunchtime session is exclusively a female-only gaming day, providing a supportive environment for students to actively participate in gaming activities.

The creation of our e-sports team signifies an exploratory chapter for our College, unlocking many opportunities and career paths for our students. Equipping them with invaluable experience in coaching, management, promotion, event organization, and marketing, all tailored to their respective e-sports teams. # RESULTS DAY

The anxious wait for A-level results ended on Thursday, as students attended college to collect their results and share their success with friends and staff.

Qualifications Wales announced in February that they would be looking to transition back to prepandemic processes, so 2023 grade boundaries were expected to drop to "broadly midway between 2019 and 2022".

Grades of learners from St David's College remained above 2023 national average grade boundaries, with notable successes in A\*- B grades being 2.4 percentage pointshigher (60.3%), and A\*- C grades being 3.6 percentage points higher (82.5%) than the national average.

Results of learners taking their AS exams are especially high, with 30.6% of grades being A grades, the top grade achievable; 5.1 percentage points above the national average. A – B grades were 6.8 percentage points higher than the national average (52.1%). This places our lower sixth learners in a very strong position as they begin their final A level year in September.

Learners on the St David's Honours Programme performed particularly well, with 59% of students' grades being an A\* or an A and 95% of grades between an A\* to C.

More than 400 learners are now progressing from St David's to university, with almost 40% of those heading to Russell Group universities. Many other learners are progressing on to apprenticeships, degree apprenticeships, and employment opportunities.

There were a huge number of success stories on a morning where 'what ifs' turned into realities. It is however important not to lose sight of individuals. Congratulations to Michael who was offered a place to study Medicine at Cardiff University after achieving four A\*s. Every teacher that taught Michael recognises how deserving he is of this place on a medicine degree programme. His results show the passion he has for his chosen field. Michael was applauded by his Medical Preparation Programme teachers as he received the news of his offer from Cardiff University, and it's fair to say that no one could hide their excitement or delight.

Congratulations to Dylan who showed real maturity and discipline in his preparation for exams this year, culminating in an outstanding set of results of A\* A\* A.

Dylan has been an active member of the college community this year. He even gave up time during his revision sessions to speak at events for learners who are starting their A-levels in September. In this waypreparing the next generation of learners for what lies ahead by sharing his own learned experience.

More stories are coming through as learners and teachers share in their excitement over what comes next.

On the results, Principal Mark Leighfield said:

"Well done to all learners who are progressing from St David's to the next chapter in their lives. We have seen a fantastic set of results, which clearly demonstrate a tremendous level of commitment and dedication from students and staff within the whole college community.

Thank you to all members of staff at St David's who have worked together to provide for our learners so well. The results we see today reflect their dedication to the young people of our community.

As a college, we now look ahead to a new year, with new students choosing to continue their education at St David's. We look ahead to the opening of our new college building, as well as to other major renovations on the college campus. There are many reasons to be grateful and excited as we move into the new academic year."

#### ST DAVID'S EXCITING NEW EXPANSION









An exciting new addition to the College began construction in June of last year and is now in its final stages, set to unveil an array of state-of-the-art facilities for both students and staff by the end of October this year.

There are a lot of reasons to get excited about our new College building, as it will house an impressive roster of features, including eight modern classrooms, an upgraded computer room, a Learning Resource Centre, an Atrium, outdoor social areas, and a state-of-the-art lecture theatre capable of encapsulating larger crowds of students for lectures.

This new structure will provide dedicated spaces for six distinct curriculum areas. Psychology, Sociology, History and Politics, which were previously located in the Annex building, will now find their classrooms in this new facility as well as Law and Criminology. The remaining rooms will be allocated for the Learner Support Centre and the Honours programme. All these new adjustments will help to free up additional space within the Annex building, facilitating the transition to the new Pastoral Hub.

If you have never been familiarised with an Atrium before, this newly appointed area will serve as an exclusive spot of relaxation for students to unwind, study, or otherwise socialize with friends. It features curved and styled red and white sofas, comfortable cushioned stools and vending machines placed throughout the room, and an open-roofed section and front-facing expansive pane glass windows that welcome in the natural sunlight. Adjacent to the Atrium, will feature various outdoor social spaces integrated around the new building. These spaces will offer students pockets for group socializing and peaceful corners for students looking to study without interruption.

The Learning Resource Centre endorses productivity and studying without distractions and easy access to the College library or utilization of the LRC's e-services. Initially located in the lower levels of the main College building, another LRC room will now be made available within the new structure, equipped with upgraded computers and modernized facilities.

The expanded lecture theatre now accommodates a larger student audience, with a capacity of 75 seats and an impressive screen that enhances the showcasing of presentations and lectures. This upgrade also helps to inspire future facilitations of host guest speakers, allowing them to address larger groups of students more effectively.

The introduction of this new building marks an exciting and exploratory phase for our College and its community. Inviting the arrival of modernized equipment and facilities, streamlining access to valuable resources for both students and staff to take advantage of. We look forward to seeing the opportunities and improvements these new features will bring to our College's future.

On October 3rd, our AS mathematics students participated in the impressively difficult Senior Mathematical Challenge hosted by the UK Maths Trust, showcasing their exceptional mathematical and problem-solving abilities. We were thrilled to see two of our AS students excelling and achieving well-deserved Gold awards, distinguishing themselves from the other AS learners, who had achieved a respectable mix of bronze and silver awards.

Both, Skylar Liao and Priya Amin displayed exceptional mathematical prowess and skill, as Skylar achieved an impressive score of 85 in the Senior Maths Challenge, closely followed by Priya Amin, who secured an equally impressive score of 81 points. Both students establishing themselves a Gold place within the competition.

The Senior Mathematical Challenge was comprised of 25 challenging mathematical questions, which our learners needed to solve within a 90-minute time window. These questions are created in a way to get students engaged, with the application of critical thinking and a wide range of mathematical and problem-solving skills. This challenge caters to both beginner and experienced problem solvers, with a range stimulating math-based challenges.

The UK Maths Trust is dedicated to promoting and enhancing the mathematical education of children and young people across the UK. To achieve this, it provides structured opportunities for learners to test and improve their mathematical skills through a series of organized mathematics competitions held throughout the academic year.

We wish both Skylar and Priya the very best

of luck as they have both been invited to participate in the Andrew Jobbings Senior Kangaroo Mathematics Challenge. These invitations are only presented to students who have obtained qualifying scores in the Senior Mathematical Challenge. We are pleased to see that Skylar and Priya are among the few students who have received invitations to compete in the Senior Kangaroo Challenge in recognition of their exceptional performance, securing Gold awards in the preliminary math challenge rounds.



St David's History students uncover local history with the CAER Heritage Project in Caerau and Ely, finding interesting archaeological discoveries dating back to ancient Rome.

The CAER Heritage Project is an ambitious project that aims to preserve and promote the rich cultural heritage of the CAER region. Established in 2011 as a collaborative effort between Action in Caerau and Ely (ACE), Cardiff University, local schools and residents, community groups and many others.

Caer Hillfort is a historically significant area located in the Rhondda Valley in South Wales, highly regarded for its archaeological impact. This nationally important site is surrounded by the west Cardiff suburbs of Caerau and Ely, which is home to some communities facing serious social and economic challenges.

From the beginning the guiding principle has been to actively promote community togetherness within groups and Archaeologists, historians and conservationists in the coproduction of archaeological and historical research to create educational opportunities, break down barriers to educational progression, promote skills development and challenge the negative perceptions of these communities and inject positive change.

St David's learners worked alongside students from Cardiff University for archaeological finds of significance, whilst focusing on the preservation of the local area's history, awarding the students with an educational experience in Welsh history and culture.

Learners were able to take part in the excavation, processing and sieving of their finds, while also being able to see some of the current finds at the site, including an arrowhead that would have been used for hunting, a blue bead from a Roman necklace and several roman coins.

Learners took a tour of the historical site and its heritage while discussing the rich history and details of the area from existing CAER Heritage scholars, who gave insight into life at Cardiff University and scholarships on offer within the ELY and Caerau area.

It's important for learners to become more knowledgeable of their local area and its rich and impressive history, as quite often students have stated that they were unaware of its location and local work, but thoroughly enjoyed the educational experience.

Giving our students a chance to participate in an Archaeological site with a taste of a possible career within this field; they're far more eager to study Early History at a University level.

Unfortunately, learners were not able to experience trips and activities from the CAER Heritage Project in recent times due to the COVID restrictions that were set in place. So, there's a boost of positivity for all our learners, having a level of normality introduced back into college life.

We're excited to organise more trips focused on discovering local history in 2023-2024.

## STUDENTS CONQUER GRUELLING 5-DAY BRECON BEACONS EXPODITION

From October 30th to November 3rd, a group of five students braved the cold and wet weather as they embarked on a challenging 5-day, 4-night expedition up the mountain in the Brecon Beacons. Navigating through rocky terrain and slippery paths, and enduring uncomfortable nights of sleep, our determined learners had completed their journey. They returned with excitement, eager to share the intricate details of their adventure, involving teamwork, attentiveness, perseverance, and the discovery of new-found skills.

Before this expedition could begin, Kayra, Durukan, Andrei, Filip, and Morgan, had to ready themselves with the not-so-easy decision of adapting to new skills to help navigate and set up tents hastily through harsh weather conditions whilst trailing up the mountain path. Andrei noted, "We acquired the skills to decipher maps and utilise specific notations. The initial day was mainly training us the basics such as map reading, navigation techniques, and tent setup."

For the first 3 nights of the journey, Storm Ciaran was ruling the mountain with fierce winds and downpours of rain, making it too dangerous for our young adventurers to continue. So, they returned to the main building, where they would then wait until the storm subsided to carry on their expedition. "Due to Storm Ciaran and the harsh conditions it created, we had the luxury of sleeping inside the building for 3 nights," added Andrei.

Returning to the mountainous path, our 5 learners would traverse difficult and diverse terrain, until they would ultimately reach their destination on

top of the 790-meter-tall mountain. The students would discover some amazing spectacles at the pinnacle of the mountain, with a panoramic view of the surrounding landscapes wrapping around the base of the mountain. However, this was not the end of their journey, as now they "had a challenging descent along a steep route. Despite walking for 6 hours, the panoramic views justify our efforts," noted. Andrei.

Another notable segment of their travels includes the "Taff path," says, Andrei. These learners embarked on a 5-hour hike along the Taff path, discovering skills on how to navigate un-pathed mountainous terrain using bearings, whilst bracing the incredible 70mph winds that continued to barrage the path ahead. Despite all these strenuous efforts throughout these 5 days, the students had learned a lot of valuable life skills and would spend, "every evening, with amazing moments of laughter and storytelling. This experience provided me with crucial lessons on teamwork, attentiveness, perseverance, and an understanding of our physical capabilities," says, Andrei.

Our learners had this to say, after their expedition:

"I feel the DofE expedition was challenging, but it helped me build up resilience" – Kayra.

"I'd like to thank Dan and Morgan for their exceptional guidance and help during the expedition and for being amazing instructors. I can't wait for the upcoming expedition in April." – Andrei.





## WORLD YOUTH DAY

In July and August 2023, St David's College students accompanied the Archdiocese of Cardiff and the Diocese of Menevia on a two-week pilgrimage to World Youth Day in Lisbon, Portugal. World Youth Day is one of the largest gatherings of people in the world, and routinely attracts between 2 and 4 million young people who want to get a sense of the Universal Church.



The theme was "Mary arose and went with haste", a quotation from the Gospel of Luke (7:39). Libby, Meg, Charlie, Aaron, Kezi, Thabo, and Dianella joined Archbishop Mark O'Toole and over fifty other pilgrims on the journey.

The first week was spent in the Diocese of Porto, exploring the rich cultural history and life of the Church from their local accommodation in the town of Aguda. Their second week was spent in Fàtima, where they visited key historical sites and welcomed Pope Francis to a public prayer service before the Shrine. The trip culminated in World Youth Day itself, a major event that hosted around 1.5 million pilgrims to a communal all-night vigil and Mass.

Meg described the vigil as a particular highlight, and expressed how much she "appreciated that there are many different ways for people to pray and there are many ways people can interact with each other and share their opinions".

Aaron went in search of an opportunity to meet new people, explore a new country, and get closer to God.

Charlie shared how it was a great chance to make new friends from all over the UK and beyond. Another pilgrim talked about how the experience was their first time outside the UK, and would recommend it to other young people: "it was an amazing experience".

While the next World Youth Day is a few years away, St David's is already arranging new opportunities for international spiritual pilgrimage and experience that welcomes students of all faiths and none. Stay tuned!





### ST DAVID'S GREEN CAREERS FAIR

From November 6th to 11th, St David's College observed National Green Careers Week by hosting a new Green Careers Fair. As climate change concerns intensify, with approximately 60% of young people expressing worry (Bath University, 2021 survey), the fair aimed to illuminate diverse career pathways available in various fields, emphasizing the crucial role each student can play in shaping a sustainable future.

The fair, open to all St David's students exploring university admissions, apprenticeships, employment, or contemplating future opportunities, attracted an estimated 600 participants engaging with exhibitors. A dynamic mix of universities and companies participated, creating a vibrant platform for students to explore and connect with potential green career options.

Prominent universities such as the University of South Wales, Cardiff Met University, Cardiff University, and Swansea University seized the opportunity to showcase their green-focused degrees. Examples include the University of South Wales presenting sustainable fashion, Cardiff Met University highlighting sustainable leisure and tourism, Cardiff University's Net Zero Innovation Institute and Swansea University promoting Environmental Science and Marine Biology degrees.

Leading companies, including Mott McDonald, EDF Energy, Principality Building Society, and entrepreneur Zoe Binning, added a practical dimension to the fair. Mott McDonald featured VR Headsets illustrating construction sites, EDF Energy spotlighted opportunities at Hinckley Point C, Principality Building Society shared sustainability initiatives for branches and headquarters, and Zoe Binning showcased her sustainable events business. The fair also welcomed engineering companies like Hoare Lea and SD Solutions, construction firms such as Tilbury Douglas, Encon, and Galliford Try, architects from Powell Dobson and Stride Treglown, and institutions like The Royal Town Planning Institute and Dwr Cymru.

She shares her journey in finding confidence through empowering communities and looks to inspire others to participate.

"Currently, I volunteer as a young leader at my local youth club" Chloe notes, where she ensures children aged 7 to 9 not only have fun, "but also get educated on important matters".

Chloe has created a trusting, safe, and informative space for these young learners, covering topics such as mental health, period poverty, healthy eating, body image, and future planning. She guides them through courses like the **Duke of Edinburgh** and cooking skills programs, providing practical skills and building their CVs for future endeavors.

Chloe's involvement with the cadets, a program coaligned with St John's Ambulance, extends to various community work like a recent sponsored walk for an ovarian cancer charity fundraising event. Engaging with the community through events like Race for Life, marathons, fun days, and police events, she actively contributes to raising awareness on issues affecting the population.

Her commitment to the online safety of young people is reflected in her contribution towards the Keep Safe Online group in Wales, with a focus on creating a space in which they can "discuss key issues we think young people face and explore ways we can educate them".

#### Chloe shed some light on why she thought it was important to volunteer:

"Firstly, the amazing people you meet! Whilst volunteering in your local area you get to learn so many things you didn't know before. It's so nice to go out of your comfort zone and interact with people you may not have ever spoken to before."

"Secondly, I would say the experience and the chance to promote personal growth. In day-to-day life we all face our own difficulties but volunteering it's a chance to challenge yourself and try something new. I think it is so important as it develops your empathy, your understanding, your communication and most importantly your perspective. This is a great thing and these kinds of skills and exposure are very useful for life."

Chloe's journey into volunteering started at her local youth club, where she gradually transitioned from visiting and socialising with friends to becoming a proficient youth leader after the club had offered Chloe to join a program called 'Stronger Me,' where she soon became a young leader. Volunteering, for her, is not just a commitment but a passion that has become an integral part of her identity. She details that "volunteering is just a part of me now, it's what I love to do, and I would be so lost without it, the opportunity, the people and everything about it just amazes me."

Recognised as a nominee for Volunteer of the Year with C3SC, Chloe emphasises the importance of meeting new people, gaining experiences, and promoting personal growth through volunteering.

For those considering volunteering but unsure where to start, Chloe offers straightforward advice: "Just do it. Embrace the experience with an open mind, caring heart, and passion for making a positive impact." In Cardiff, there are numerous opportunities for voluntary work, from charity shops to local clubs and youth organisations.

Chloe's nomination was a tremendous achievement, and her dedication and impact were evident, standing out as the only 16-year-old among nominees aged 25.


